*The Scripture Reading: John 12.34-50

- ³⁴ So the crowd answered Him, "We have heard from the Law that the Christ remains forever. How can You say that the Son of Man must be lifted up? Who is this Son of Man?"
- ³⁵ So Jesus said to them, "The light is among you for a little while longer. Walk while you have the light, lest darkness overtake you. The one who walks in the darkness does not know where he is going.
- ³⁶ While you have the light, believe in the light, that you may become sons of light." When Jesus had said these things, He departed and hid Himself from them.
- ³⁷ Though He had done so many signs before them, they still did not believe in Him.
- ³⁸ so that the word spoken by the prophet Isaiah might be fulfilled: "Lord, who has believed what he heard from us, and to whom has the arm of the Lord been revealed?"
- ³⁹ Therefore they could not believe. For again Isaiah said,
- ⁴⁰ "He has blinded their eyes and hardened their heart, lest they see with their eyes, and understand with their heart, and turn, and I would heal them."
- ⁴¹ Isaiah said these things because he saw His glory and spoke of Him.
- ⁴² Nevertheless, many even of the authorities believed in Him, but for fear of the Pharisees they did not confess it, so that they would not be put out of the synagogue;
- for they loved the glory that comes from man more than the glory that comes from God.
- ⁴⁴ Ånd Jesus cried out and said, "Whoever believes in Me, believes not in Me but in Him who sent Me.
- ⁴⁵ And whoever sees Me sees Him who sent Me.
- ⁴⁶ I have come into the world as light, so that whoever believes in Me may not remain in darkness.
- ⁴⁷ If anyone hears My words and does not keep them, I do not judge him; for I did not come to judge the world but to save the world.
- ⁴⁸ The one who rejects Me and does not receive My words has a judge; the word that I have spoken will judge him on the last day.
- ⁴⁹ For I have not spoken on My own authority, but the Father who sent Me has Himself given Me a commandment—what to say and what to speak.
- 5º And I know that His commandment is eternal life. What I say, therefore, I say as the Father has told Me."





John 12.34-50 "Believe in the Light"

Discussion Questions

The following questions help us engage with the sermon, music, and liturgy in this morning's worship service, and may be useful during personal devotions, group studies, and family worship.

1.	What is faith? Why is faith essential to the Christian life?
2.	Read John 12.35. What does Jesus mean by "the light" and "the darkness"? What does it look like to walk in the light?
3.	How are Jesus' words in John 12.35-36 an echo of the prologue in John 1?
4.	Read 6.1-6 and John 12.41. Who did Isaiah see according to the Apostle John?
5.	Why did the authorities who believed in Jesus not confess it?
6.	Read John 12.44-50. What does genuine faith in Jesus have to do with keeping His commandments?
7.	What does Jesus mean when He says, "His commandment is eternal life"? (See John 12.50) How did Jesus fulfill this commandment for us?
